Making a Living in the Colonies

1. Possible answers: Winters were long and the soil was poor. Farmers practiced

subsistence farming. Farmers relied on their children for labor.

2. Possible answers: The climate was mild and the soil fertile. Farmers practiced

large-scale farming. Farmers grew large quantities of cash crops.

3. Possible answers: The climate was warm and the soil rich. Farmers grew large

quantities of cash crops on plantations. Farmers depended on enslaved people

to work in the fields.

4. Answers will vary. Possible answers: New England industries included grain and

lumber mills, shipbuilding, shipping, and fishing. Middle Colonies industries included

home-based crafts like carpentry, or large businesses like lumber mills

and small-scale manufacturing. In the Southern Colonies, little industry developed.

5. Answers will vary. Possible answers will include wheat, rice, tobacco

6. The Middle Colonies attracted many German, Dutch, Swedish, and other non-

English settlers. They added variety, or diversity, to the population.

fields. Indentured servants became scarce and expensive, so Southern planters

began using slave labor.

8. England: Ships were loaded with trade goods. Then the ships traveled to the coast of West Africa.

West Africa: In West Africa, the goods were traded for enslaved Africans. The ships then left for America with the enslaved people.

The colonies in America: In America, the ships unloaded the enslaved people and took on goods from the colonies. Then they returned to Great Britain, completing the triangle.

- 9. On ships traveling the Middle Passage, enslaved people were chained together. They could hardly sit or stand. They got little food or water. If they refused to eat, they were whipped. Many did not survive the Middle Passage.
- 10. Slave codes included rules such as these: Enslaved people were not allowed to learn to read or write, they could not leave the plantation, they could not gather in groups, they were whipped for minor offenses and hanged or burned to death for serious crimes.
